This Is Our Story ...

Our own Maria deArmas was one of the more than 14,000 children flown from Cuba to safety in the United Sates during the Pedro Pan airlift in the early 60's. The operation was a unique effort for Cuban children to escape the Castro regime's forced reeducation and to find care within Catholic institutions or with relatives.

Maria was able to attend the 60th year reunion of the group in Miami, and to view a special exhibit at the American Museum of the Cuban Diaspora. The exhibit paints a picture of what life was like for a child in Cuba, where the world revolved around family, school and religion.

Maria's children and two grandchildren attended as well, and they were able to see her name and photo in the files, part of the artifacts on display. The trip was filled with memories as Maria met with old friends and relatives, and she delighted in relating the old stories to her family. Many of the children are now prominent members of the South Florida community including former Miami City mayors, and United States Senator Mel Martinez, Yale University Professor and bestselling author of memoir "Waiting for Snow in Havana", and Miguel Bezos, adoptive father of technology company Amazon founder and CEO Jeff Bezos.

Message from Patti Abernethy—

"After the unexpected November fireworks conducted by Reach Church (on the corner of 896 and Glasgow Ave), Representative Eric Morrison and Senator Stephanie Hansen worked with the county Fire Marshall to see that communities are notified regarding organizations obtaining permits for use of fireworks

Initial contacts were attempted multiple times to reps at Reach Church to give them the idea that elected officials could advise communities regarding upcoming permits for fireworks. Lots of neighbors were surprised, upset (some even awakened out of sleep), and concerned (thinking there might be explosions close by) when the fireworks sponsored by the church occurred. The local website, NextDoor, was replete with negative comments.

Our officials worked out a protocol with the Fire Marshall that will mean they will be notified when permits have been approved, so that constituents can be made aware.

The Fire Marshall's Office generally requires a permit thirty days before a fireworks display, although that does not always happen. Often, permits are issued one or two weeks before the event once the display site has been inspected and deemed appropriate. Still, this notice should give elected officials an opportunity to notify constituent via various methods beforehand.

Thanks to Senator Hansen and Representative Eric Morrison for resolving this issue."





While in graduate school, as a National Defense Fellow, he pioneered coherent parallel optical processing and laser physics. When he left academia, he joined the prestiguos Engineering Physics Laboratory of E. I. du Pont de

Nemours and Company where he continued to pioneer laser physics, earning more than a half dozen patents, mostly in medical diagnostic imaging. Ed has a thirst for knowledge, and for sharing that knowledge. Jane's Parkinson's disease has given him focus to learn more about the human body and to use what he learns to help Jane and others.
