Does wisdom really come with age?

As you will see, this issue is chock full of wonderful contributions from our residents. The ones that touched me the most were those submitted by proud grandparents, announcing births, graduations, and honors. It made me think of the lessons learned from our parents, the values and qualities we pass on to our children, and the wisdom that transcends generations. It turns out that wisdom really does come with age! According to a study conducted by the University of Montreal, the brains of

those over 55 years of age are used more efficiently than their younger counterparts.

According to researchers, the fact that younger people can come up with answers more quickly is not reflective of wisdom, but rather of inexperience. Canadian scientists associated with the Institute of Geriatrics at the University of Montreal created two groups of test subjects, one younger and one older, and asked them to perform a variety of tasks while their brains were scanned.

Neuro-imaging scans revealed that younger participants, after making a mistake, activated several different parts of the brain to help them decide what to do next. Older participants didn't start thinking about what to do next until the game restarted, showing greater mental efficiency, according to the scientists.

"When the young participants made a mistake and had to plan and execute a new strategy to get the right answer, various parts of their brains were recruited even before the next task began," study author Dr. Oury Monehi said.

"However, when the older participants learned that they had made a mistake, these regions were only recruited at the beginning of the next trial, indicating that with age, we decide to make adjustments only when absolutely necessary."

"The older brain has experience and knows that nothing is gained by jumping the gun. We now have neurobiological evidence showing that with age comes wisdom and that as the brain gets older, it learns to better allocate its resources."

VOLC Board Update

On May 6, our community formalized the election of our board members for the Maintenance Corporation. Along with the turnover of the funds for the Maintenance Corporation's ongoing responsibilities for the storm water management system, the Corporation began readying itself for additional responsibilities that are coming our way. The first of these will be a transfer of the Architectural Committee (ARC) duties. This Committee reviews and approves homeowner requests for exterior changes, additions, or renovations or reconstruction of individual homeowners' homes and or landscaping that is described in the governing documents, particularly **Article 6 of the VOLC Active Adult/Lot Maintenance Declaration of Restrictions and the subsequent Policy Supplement.** We currently are handling these with the Board members, but expect to formalize a committee to assume these duties in early July. Kitty Heston will be the Board liaison for ARC.

This won't be a big change from current process. The guidelines that ARC has followed in the past will remain. The application process will continue to use the same format as the present Architectural Review Request Application Form. Forms are available at the model home and in the clubhouse. A completed application will now be submitted to any of our Board members instead of BC Communities. The Board, instead of BC/Benchmark, will consider the application, and provide a written response as promptly as possible. If a response is not received by the homeowner within 60 days, it is deemed the application is approved.

We are encouraged that several of our neighbors have expressed an interest in serving on ARC. It is in the best interest of our community that ARC function efficiently, fairly, and reasonably to maintain a pleasing environment for our residents and marketable curb appeal for The Village of Long Creek which includes consistency in architectural style, scale, materials and details and approved colors for siding, trim and doors, and virtually all changes to the exterior of the property. All of us received copies of the ARC guidelines when we closed on our homes. These guidelines were formulated by the builder and developer, and were formalized into restrictive covenants and deed restrictions that residents are required to follow. Should we elect, they can be changed going forward by a 66% affirmative vote of all residents. To maintain the desirable look of our community and harmony between residents, we need to be aware of these restrictions, and the approval process for changes. Being versed in these restrictions and fully utilizing the approval process can minimize or eliminate headaches down the road.



Her entire church community feted her with a luncheon after the service. When talking with Lois about this retirement, I found out that she actually has many more years in this "gift" we call music. Lois' Mom, Dad, and siblings were musicians—wind instruments, piano, organ, etc. Music has always been an important part of her life.

Lois studied at Lowell College and then U Mass so that she was qualified to be both a musician and a teacher of music (student teaching in grades K-12). When it came to the final recital for her degree, Lois dressed up in her full-length gown, came out onto the stage, bowed, and saw the entire football team in the first few rows—they had been her students and were there to support her. She still smiles when she remembers that experience. Prior to playing the pipe organ, her favorite, Lois was a soloist (contralto) and played with the Billy Vale Greek Dance Band in Lowell, MA. 
